SURVIVING

- What's necessary to exist?
- Satisfied
- Day-to-Day focused
- Life seen through limitations
- Often characterized by worry
- Coping

THRIVING

- What's necessary to grow?
- Progressively content
- Future-oriented
- Life seen through possibilities
- Often characterized by trust
- Flourishing

THE PROBLEM

Just like people, churches can fall into unhealthy patterns of survival mode that do not promote vitality and growth.

OF SURVIVAL




1. TRAUMA

¹⁴ We must no longer be children, tossed to and fro and blown about by every wind of doctrine, by people's trickery, by their craftiness in deceitful scheming; ¹⁵ but speaking the truth in love, we must grow up in every way into him who is the head, into Christ, ¹⁶ from whom the whole body, joined and knit together by every ligament with which it is equipped, as each part is working properly promotes the body's growth in building itself up in love.




Background Location: Ephesus Date: 58-59; 7-90 AD Author: Paul (?) **Purpose**: God's plan to unite believers through Jesus Christ.




Background Key Themes: Unity, Death and Resurrection of Jesus, New Life, Holy Spirit, Church as family of God.



- "we must grow" (v. 15); "promotes the body's growth" (v. 16). = The growth of the Church is not inevitable; we can grow or remain stagnant depending on our choices. - "as each part is working properly" (v. 16) = The health of the Church is best measured collectively.



V. 14 – Our spiritual maturity as individual believers is related to the health of our spiritual community [The Church].



V. 15 – God's Church is constantly working to maintain health. A Church of health is not a location; it is a reality.

<u>|</u>am responsible for <u>my</u> church's ability to thrive. Therefore, <u>|</u>must examine my actions, attitudes, and approach as I take an active role in creating <u>my</u> church's health.

- 8. Lacked clear purpose.
- 9. The "Idol of Image." *"Brand before mission."*
- 10. Church refused to reflect.
- 11. Unaddressed cultural trauma and/or toxicity.
